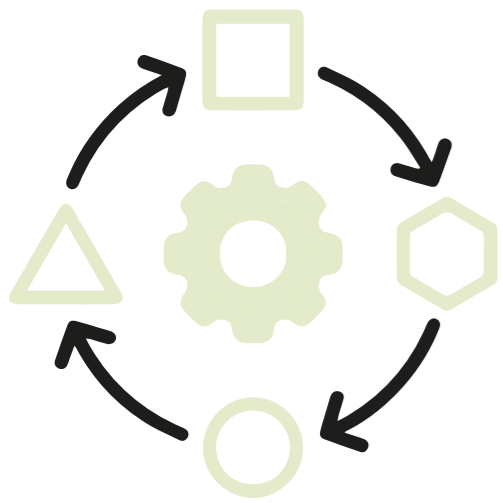

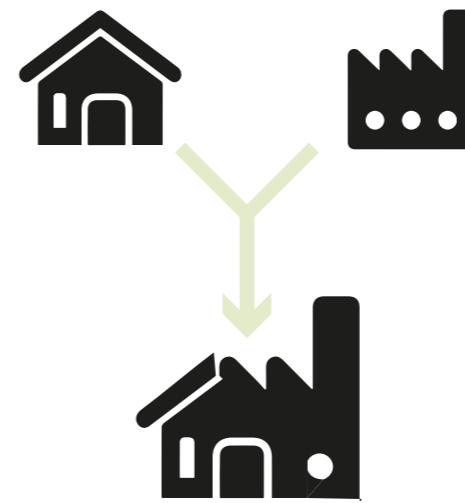

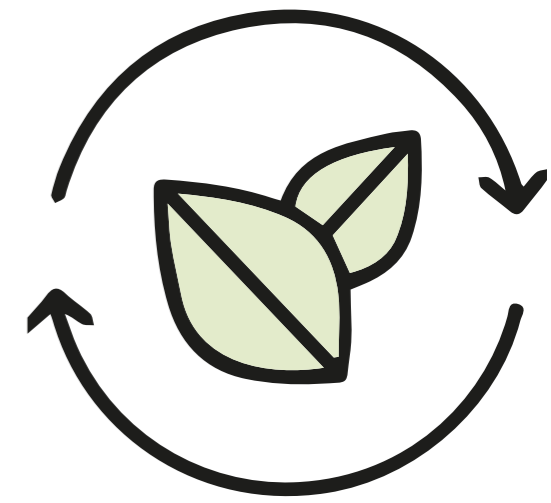

The housing market is under pressure as it has become unable for the majority of starters and single-person households to aquire a home.



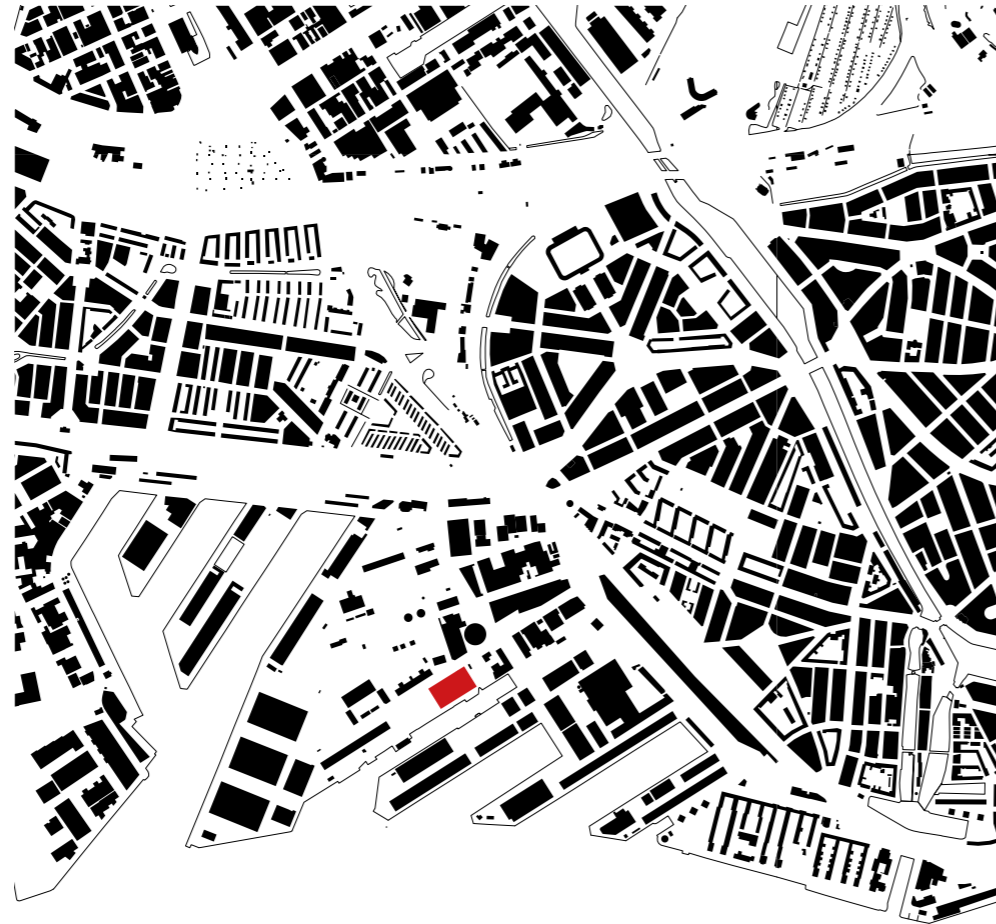

Create a building that allows the mix of production and living while creating affordable housing for a wide array of target groups. This building is a prototype for an adaptable typology that could be helpful in combatting the housing crisis.

Key takeaways context analysis



- 1** The lack of connection between the M4H area and the rest of the urban plan
- 1a** Dike, road and rail infrastructure presents permanent physical barrier to existing residential area.
- 1b** Multiple layers of transport infrastructure, primarily roadways, create physical barrier between M4H and Marconiplein.
- 1c** Shopping centre and Dakpark along Vierhavensstraat creates strong, impermeable street wall, blocking access between existing residential areas and M4H. Possible future connections between the urban tissues are implied by existing landscape design.
- 1d** Multi-lane road with very few crossings presents barrier between shopping centre and M4H. Opportunity to create a strong street wall along Vierhavensstraat to establish identity for M4H precinct.

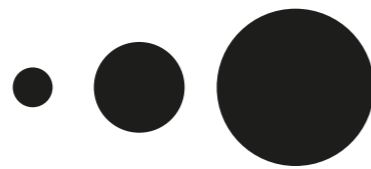
The need for a Hybrid factory

- New innovation in manufacturing gives the opportunity to mix production and living



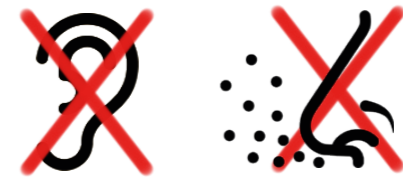

RAILWAY
The railway is important for the logistical hub. This hub wants to make the transition of goods between trains and streets easier by integrating it into the logistical hub

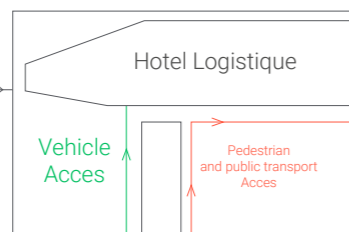
ROOF TERRACE
The roof terrace is used for public functions such as urban farming and sport fields. This is useful to blend the living facilities with the logistical hub

MAIN STREET
A constant exchange between the hub and the residential area, through the programmatic design of the hub.

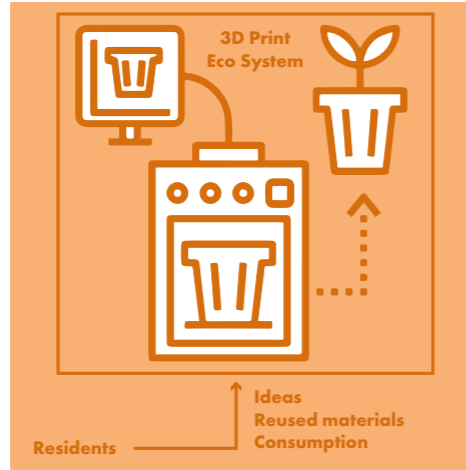
RESIDENTIAL AREA
The area next to the logistical hub is the residential area which accommodates all the living needs in total there are 1100 apartments

QUALITATIVE GREEN SPACES
The La Chapelle area introduces new qualitative green spaces. These public areas are connected with the Logistical hub through the streets

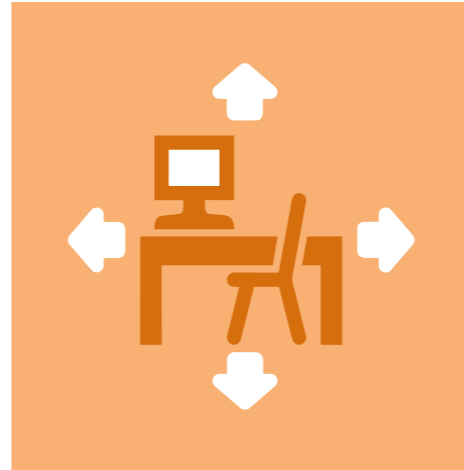
LOGISTICAL SYSTEM
Vehicles go in through this side they have an exchange with the logistical function and they are on their way again. The site connects from here with the streets into Paris, The highway into France and the Railway



PUBLIC FUNCTIONS
This side of the facade is filled by offices and public functions such as gyms and shops. This side facilitates the combination of living and a logistical hub

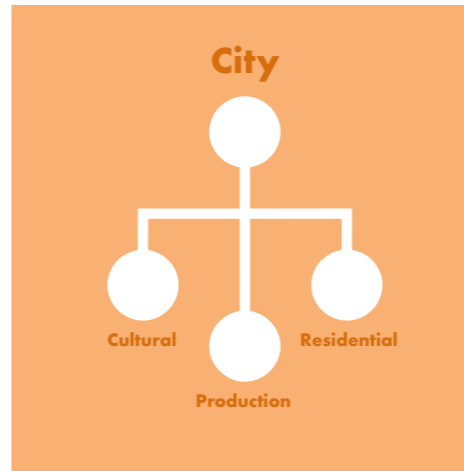

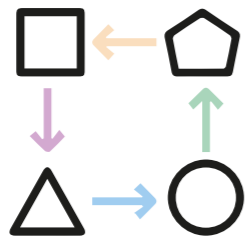

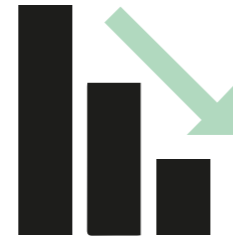
Modular architecture is an architecture that is built by using a modular building technique, this means that the building is composed of modules, components or elements which are built off-site.



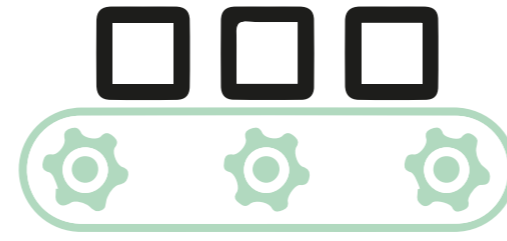

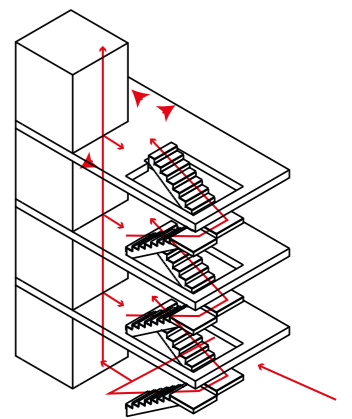
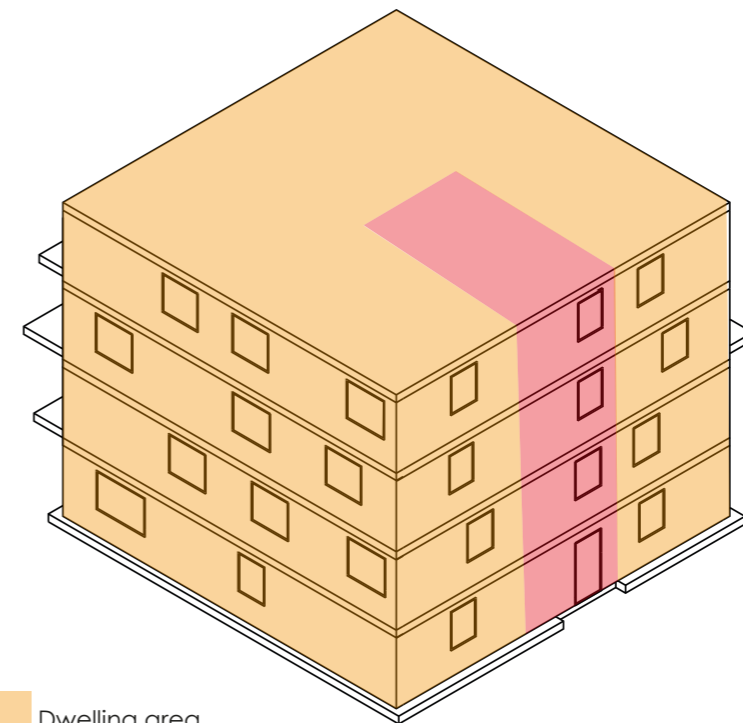
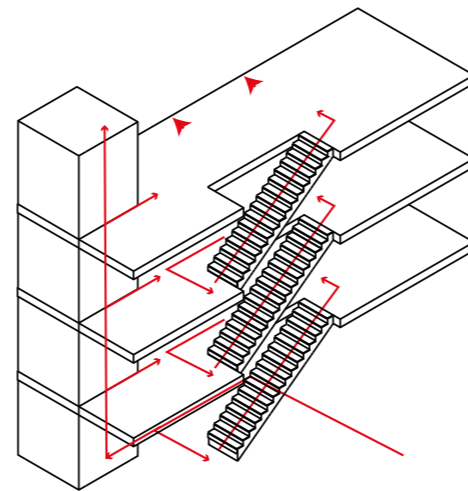
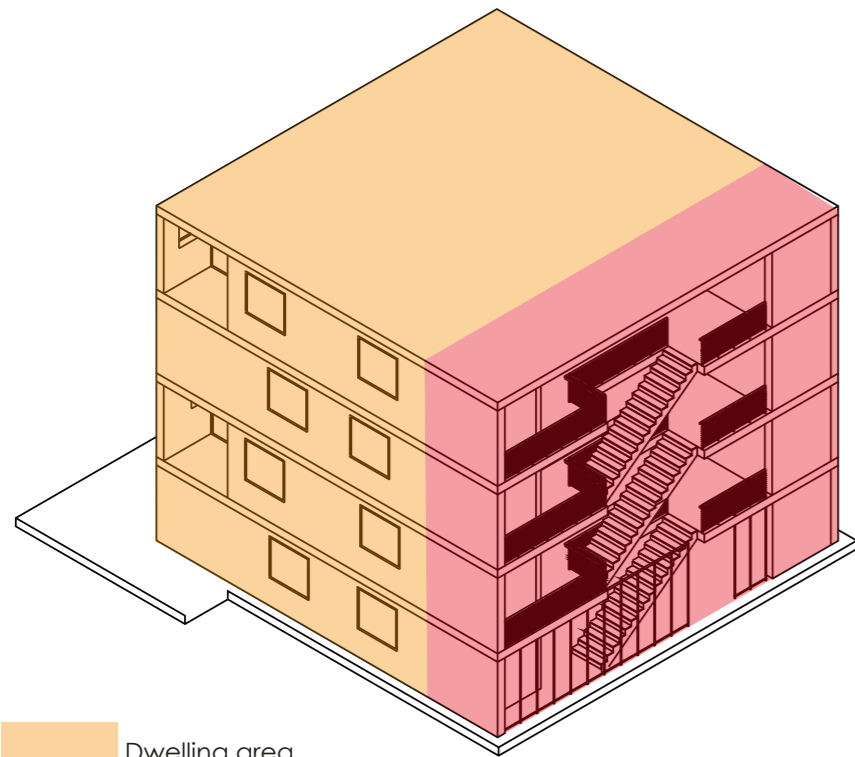


Figure 5: Bremer Punkt 1 the first prototype (LIN Architect, n.d.)

- Functions that dont need light designed towards the core and that do need light designed towards the outside

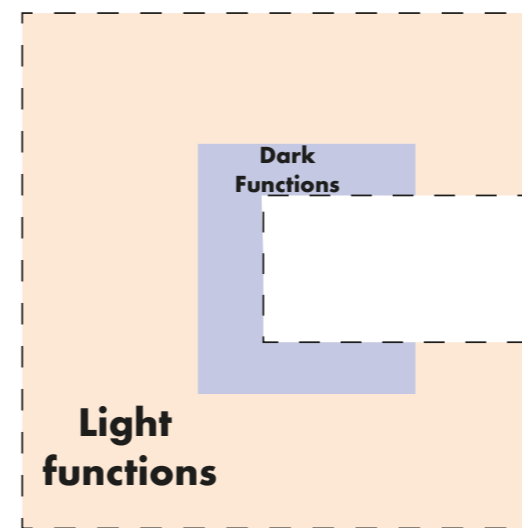
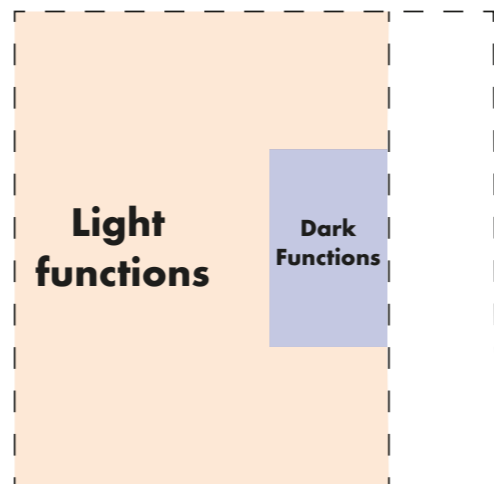
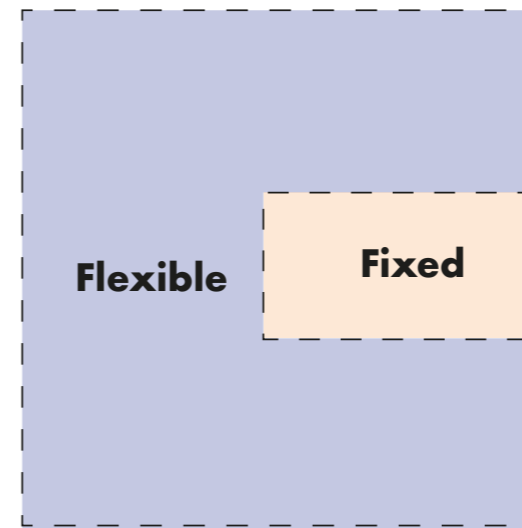
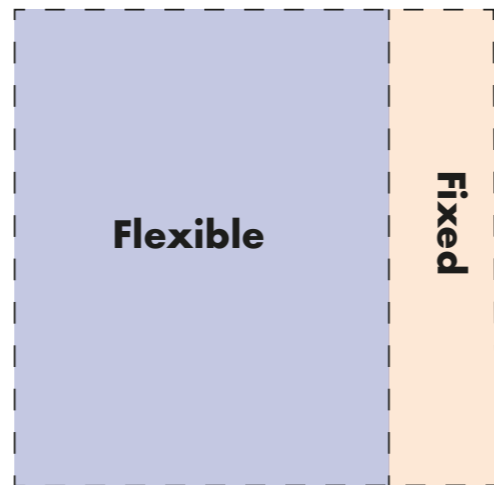
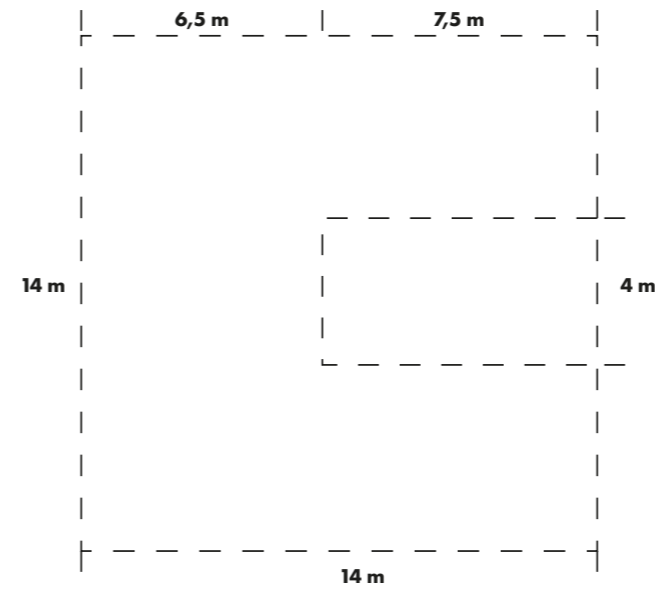
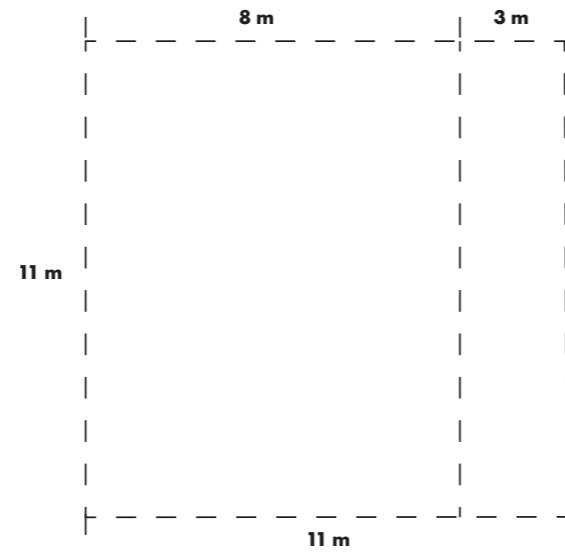
