The task at hand is the design of a productive building which revolves around a culturally relevant produce and manages to evoke the social rituals and greater historic context which go with it. This should strengthen and reinstate pride towards local produce, reform ties to the country and its rich lands, and also support the citizens and the complex urban life which surround it. The design of an urban winery and arak distillery shall be the assignment utilized as means of researching and exploring this challenge.

Process

Method description

The journey of grape based drinks, from the Phoenicians across the Mediterranean to the Arabs and then to the French and back to Lebanon, indirectly unfolds a substantial part of the history of the country and region. The challenge is to tell this story through the architecture which processes the grape. The various stages in the process vary in telling ways from culture to culture and these differences need to be studied and utilized strategically in order to curate the experience. Starting from wineries in Lebanon, a comparison needs to be formulated between these varying examples themselves, as well as in comparison to French, ancient, and additional relevant references. Through this the typology will be thoroughly understood but also the varying nuances and their cultural implications.

The construct also requires qualities of a museum to be integrated within, whilst simultaneously needing to remain functional and eventful in order to establish an integral link to the community. For this reason the museum typology will be analyzed once a clear and extensive understanding of the history has been devised. Successively I shall delve into the typologies and practices surrounding local bars and drinking culture, and restaurants and traditional dining practices which are so often coupled with wine or arak by those that do enjoy drink. Like this I would be able to understand trends and traditional practices which can help design meaningful but also simply more popular configurations.

This project would need to deal with the suburban context within which the selected site is situated. Being exactly within the open center, at which also the various socio-cultural groups come together, gives rise to a specific responsibility which aligns with the public and influential ambition of the winery. To an overly congested, segregated, and privatized city, it is imperative that a cultural project reacts to such factors, and

adapts itself to the specific variations within the site. For this reason the winery shall need to understand typologies within central public spaces, more specifically a park, and understand also how a production entity can configure itself within whilst accomplishing various ambitions. Relevance to traditional and culturally relevant architectural typologies will help understand what constitutes a popular landmark building fit for the Beirut context which supports the life of its diverse population.

Literature and general practical preference

The literature to be consulted will consist of; Historic data on the traits and architecture of the various cultures which influenced Lebanon and contributed to the nation's story of wine. Namely books such as "Tears of Bacchus", and "Lebanese Wines", written or edited by Michael Karam, which revolve around Wine in the Middle East. Additionally articles and journals which focus on viniculture in Lebanon and the Mediterranean, both present day developments but also historic and archaeological findings which bring about a series of perspectives from which to assess the context.
