

The drawing explores how tourism acts as leverage to stimate and allow other economies to grow. And although tied with honourable agents and landscapes, it eventually threatens them.




The drawing focuses on how the tourism industry facilitates new forms of territorialisation by unsolicited extractive industries.

This raises two key questions: how each industry spatialises and territorialises in terms of scale and impact, and how they indirectly interact.




